

The Fentons – a legacy of family & community

You can't just talk about Fenton without one talking about the Fenton family.

For years, the Appleseed Restaurant in Bradford has been an area icon with a great menu and awesome Sunday buffet.

The building was called the Appleseed Inn when Peter and Mary Beth Fenton first bought the property in 1977. They later changed the name to Appleseed Restaurant.

Tim said his mom's family ran delis in Rhode Island. Aunts and uncles helped get the Appleseed running; it's now been in the family for 46 years.

The main core of the family is Peter, Mary Beth and their sons Re-Pete and Tim, which now also includes Re-Pete's and Tim's wives, Beth and Lacey.

The ladies do a lot of behind-the-scenes catering work. They are an immensley wonderful asset.

When later asked why the names Pete, Re-Pete and Tim often come up and not the women, Re-Pete said, "'Cuz we're the loudest. It's a family business in every sense of the word. We get along better than many other families."

Tim also talked about it all being one big family business; a divide and conquer while they still help one another out. He's hoping his kids will be a fourth generation.

Re-Pete had much praise for his parents. "The biggest thing is they made the business work. Mom and Dad never gave up. They've touched lives in so many ways."



Some of those ways are how they give back to the community. They are always there to help during emergencies, delivering Thanksgiving baskets and so much more.

"They always gave as much as they could," Re-Pete said. "They are lowkey about it. It's not about recognition but in doing it for right reasons."

In talking with Tim, and later, Re-Pete, both have many wonderful memories of growing up in the house above the Appleseed. Re-Pete went to culinary school to be-

come a chef. Tim went into business management and eventually got his captain's license.

"Mom and Dad are not resistant to change," is another praise Re-Pete gave his parents. They always allowed him and Tim the freedom to try new things including "the huge investment in technology things." "Tim and I work with our best friends. We are truly lucky."

The family also extends to those who work with them. Many in the area communities also feel like family to the Fentons. "My folks have always strived to create a family-style environment,"

Tim said. It's important to "make guests feel like family."

Some people tell us we "won the parents lottery." Re-Pete said, "My dad is my biggest idol."

The legacy has grown to include not only the Appleseed Restaurant and Catering, but Fenton's Landing and Sunapee Cruises. They hire kids 14-16 years old, give them a good start in a great environment.

"We learned a lot about boats in a short amount of time," Re-Pete said of becoming "accidental boat owners in 2003." Tim said the cruises had been in operation for years before Lacey's grandfather bought Sunapee Cruises in the 1960s. So, in one aspect, the cruises stayed in the family even when the Fentons took over.

Tim talked of his love for the family business and the harbor. Lake Sunapee is a really clean lake. It's fed by natural springs and is a reservoir for Sunapee. He's on the boats a lot and said he "loves making connections."

About the Landing, he said, "I love it here; the funkiness, the locals, running into people you know ..." "The Landing is a fun place for community, kind of a deli vibe."

And he talked about the boats. The original M.V. Mt. Sunapee's hull was wooden and in 1966 it was replaced with steel. The recently refurbished M.V. Mt. Sunapee II was put back into the lake at the beginning of May. However, they are still waiting for some late delivery of parts before the boat will be fully operational. Soon that will also be ready for cruises.



Meanwhile, the Lake Queen is conducting afternoon and dinner boat cruises. And what a gorgeous boat it is. There's a bar and a buffet table on the lower level. The tables and chairs are beautiful and of good quality which adds a touch of elegance to the cruise. Most of the upper deck is also covered. However, an outdoor promenade around the perimeter with extra room on the bow and stern allows for experiencing the fresh air.

Tim said they work closely with marine engineers to make the boats as safe as possible. There are monitors to track weather. They are often able to do cruises even if raining.

The boat can be rented for weddings, family reunions, memorial services, private parties, dinners, anniversaries, school groups, rehearsals, moonlight cruises and more. A cruise on the lake is a wonderful experience with the captain telling stories and explaining about the lake.

The MV Kearsarge is no longer seaworthy. Future plans may include bringing it ashore to an empty lot and turning it into a beer and wine garden.



Local Area Covered Bridges

Andover

Keniston Bridge, #15, Lorden Road over Blackwater River; built 1882, rehabilitated 1981; style: town lattice truss, 64 feet long; posted for six ton and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Cilleyville/Bog Bridge, #16, Rtes. 11 and 4 spanning Pleasant Brook; built 1887. It was bypassed in 1959 and restricted to foot traffic. The bridge was the model for murals of typical New Hampshire scenes which were once located in the State House in Concord. Roof repairs 1962 and 1982; style: town lattice truss, 53 feet long; pedestrian only since 1959 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Bradford

Bement Bridge, #14, Center Road spanning the Warner River; built 1854, rebuilt 1947, repaired in 1969, 1987, 1990 and 2021; style: long truss, 60 feet long; posted for three tons and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Hopkinton

Railroad Bridge, **#10**, Route 103 spanning the Contoocook River in Contoocook Village; style: double town-Pratt lattice truss, 140 feet long, on the old Concord and Claremont Railroad line, said to be the oldest covered bridge still standing in the U.S. and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Rowell's Bridge, #9, north of Route 127 on Clement Hill Road and carries the Rowell Bridge Road over the Contoocook River; style: combination of long truss, 164 feet long, with Burr arches; posted for six tons and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Newport

Corbin Bridge, #17, North Newport Road over the Croydon Branch of the Sugar River; built approximately 1845; style: town lattice truss, 96 feet long; posted for six tons and listed on National Register of Historic Places.

Waterloo Bridge, #13, Newmarket Road crossing the Warner River; style: town lattice truss, 76 feet long; built in 1840, rebuilt in 1857, again in 1970 and "rehabilitated by the state" in 1987; posted for six ton and listed on National Register of Historic Places.



Also check the fish and game website for boating and fishing information.

Note: Drone use is restricted in all New Hampshire state parks.

Hiking:

Sunapee-Ragged-Kearsarge Greenway is 75-miles of hiking trails linking the summits of Sunapee, Ragged and Kearsarge mountains and maintained by the SRKG Coalition. SRKG volunteer members lead hikes throughout the summer, plus there are other events offered. Maps, calendar of events, trail closures, guide book and more can be found at www.srkg.com.

Summer 2023 at Mount Sunapee offers many trails including the ski trails, Summit Hiking Trail, Lake Solitude Hiking Trail and the Newbury Hiking Trail. There's also the Andrew Brook Trail (great for families) off Mountain Road which also will take you to

Lake Solitude. Visit www. mountsunapee.com and click on "Summer at Mount Sunapee" for list of events.

Mt. Kearsarge South (there's a Mt. Kearsarge North in Chatham) can be hiked from two sides. Rollins State Park in Warner has a nice family hike up the mountain. The Wilmot side is a more challenging hike from Winslow State Park.

For suggestions and trail maps, also visit the New London, Newbury or Sunapee information booths. Town halls are also a good source for maps and information compiled by the town's conservation commission.

Pillsbury State Park in Washington, off Rte. 31, is crossed by a network of hiking and mountain bike trails. These trails offer easy to moderate hiking in fairly remote settings. The park is an important link in the Monadnock-Sunapee Greenway, a 51-mile trail connecting Mt. Monadnock with Mt. Sunapee in the north.

Rails to Trails:

Many towns and areas are getting involved in the Rails to Trails movement which turns the old railroad lines into well-maintained four-season recreational trails. These trails provide wonderful easy hiking and biking allowing anyone the opportunity to enjoy the scenic views and experience the natural beauty of the areas. Some allow horseback riding.

One such trail is the 59-mile Northern Rail Trail which runs from the Concord city line to Lebanon. There are many parking areas and trailheads along the route.

The Concord-Lake Sunapee section passes through several towns, some of which still may be in planning stages. The Stevens Rail Trail, 1.3 miles, is between Warner and Hopkinton. The Warner Rail Trail is a 1-mile section. Bradford hosts 1 mile of the Tilly-Wheeler Trail and Lower Lake Todd segment.

Kearsarge-Sunapee area visitors can park at Potter Place at the intersection of Rtes. 4 and 11 in Andover or at the Highland Lake Inn trailhead in East Andover. The Danbury General Store also has trail access along with parking, bathrooms and food. For more information and to find maps and where to park, check www.nhstateparks.org and look under the Trails Bureau or visit www.fnrt.org.

Boating:

In Andover, the Blackwater River is highly recommended for kayaking. Also, Highland Lake has a great scenic shoreline. Public boat access is off Channel Road.

Bradford's Lake Massasecum has a public boat ramp off Rte. 114 with limited parking.

Eastman Lake, aka Eastman Pond is located in Enfield, Grantham and Springfield. Public boat access is at Eastman West and has a 10 mph speed limit.

In New London, try the Little Lake Sunapee and explore around Colby Point if you like loons. Also, Pleasant Lake has a town beach and public boat ramp in Elkins. located mostly in New London.

Kezar Lake, North Sutton, is another good bet for canoeing or kayaking. The public boat ramp is next to Smiley Grove in North Sutton village near the beach. You can also hike or bike the 3 miles around the lake. If you're lucky, you can spot the nesting eagle.

Lake Sunapee, the fifth largest lake in the state offers four boat ramps, 11 islands and three lighthouses.
